3. Der Erste Weltkrieg war in weitaus höherem Maße ein Weltereignis als dies eine immer noch überwiegend eurozentrische Weltkriegsgeschichtsschreibung suggeriert. Die Vorlesung wird dies am indischen Fall demonstrieren. Indien war mit insgesamt 1,3 Millionen Kriegsteilnehmern, die in bewaffneten Einheiten oder Arbeitskommandos auf Kriegsschauplätzen in Europa, dem Nahen Osten und Ostafrika dienten, eine entscheidende militärische Personalreserve des britischen Empires. Jedoch waren es nicht allein oder in erster Linie die neuen Erfahrungen dieser Kriegsteilnehmer, die den Weltkrieg für Indien zu einem historischen Ereignis mit langfristigen und tiefgreifenden Folgen machten. Die Vorlesung untersucht deshalb die Erfahrungen von Frontsoldaten und Kriegsgefangenen ebenso wie die sozialen Verwerfungen und die politische Resonanz in den Rekrutierungsregionen der Kolonialarmee. Sie beleuchtet den Zusammenhang von Weltkrieg und zunehmender Delegitimierung von britischer Herrschaft und „europäischer Zivilisation“, die sich in neuen intellektuellen Strömungen, in der Popularisierung nativistischer, panislamischer und sozialrevolutionärer Ideen sowie in der Transformation der politischen Kultur während der Zwischenkriegsperiode manifestierte. Sie betrachtet darüber hinaus die quasi-protektionistische Abschirmung der indischen Ökonomie während des Weltkrieges, die den Aufstieg indischen Unternehmertums förderte, sowie die heftigen sozialen Schockwirkungen der globalen Nachkriegskrise. 3. Over the past century, research has identified multidirectional links between religion and health: religious differences have been related to a wide range of physical and mental health outcomes as well as to healthcare seeking behaviour. South Asia has historically been home to diverse, dynamic systems of medicine and medical practices which are inextricable from religion and faith. Often deemed "alternative", "complementary" and/or "holistic" in the developed world, many of these practices and systems are still patronised extensively in many parts of South Asia; often jointly with access to "Western", allopathic medicine. This course explores the complex relationship between religion, the body, health and medicine in South Asia using diverse literature from history, anthropology, epidemiology and sociology. This course will begin by describing the plural traditions of medicine in South Asia (Unani, Siddha, Ayurveda and Tibetan folk medicine) and exploring their histories and current status among contemporary populations. In addition to describing how these systems perceive health, illness and the body, this set of lectures will specifically study how colonization and European contact generated wide-reaching changes in "indigenous", religious systems/practices of medicine. We also seek to understand how religion itself impacts healthcare seeking behaviour in South Asia? We will consider how biomedicine itself was framed and understood within religious parameters when it was first introduced by the colonial state and by missionaries. Missionary medicine in particular, allows us to assess religious constructions of and responses to biomedicine and its technologies such as smallpox vaccination. This course also seeks to focus on the uneasy and often ambivalent encounter between biomedicine and traditional medicine in South Asia by considering case studies such as variolation and vaccination for smallpox. This course also discusses contexts within which plural medical traditions experienced a "revival" in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries in South Asia; particularly the linkages between the nascent nationalist movements and the rise of "Hindu" and 'Muslim' science/medicine.

3. The increasing entanglement between religion and politics is one of the most important and controversial developments of the 20th century. Across the world, various religious movements have adopted a notably pro-active position (in intellectual and practical terms) towards political questions. This course aims to explore such issues through an in-depth engagement with the politics of Islamic movements in the modern world. Rather than working with a one-size-fits-all definition of “political Islam”, “Islamism”, or “jihad”, the aim will be to investigate the theory and practice of prominent Islamic thinkers, movements and ordinary activists. What are their intellectual origins? How have these movements, thinkers and ideas changed over time? Politics too is not understood in an abstract sense here. Instead we would pose concrete questions such as how has an Islamic movement (say Jamaat-e-Islami) or thinker (say Sayyid Qutb) thought about and addressed problems related to the nation-state, democracy, citizenship, colonialism and so on? Differently stated, the aim is not to work out an overarching framework to comprehend the links between “politics” and “Islam” in every situation. We will explore these questions historically and in comparative perspective – South Asia and the Middle East, to be precise – by drawing on scholarship from political science, Islamic studies, anthropology, and history. A basic understanding of Islam, its early history and key concepts is expected of students who sign up for this course. Those who lack such a background can be provided with some introductory readings, though they will not be discussed as part of a seminar.

Requirements: For students of CeMIS the evaluation will be on the basis of two assignments. Students (individually, or in pairs, depending upon the numbers enrolled) will make a 15-minute in-class presentation based on a week's readings. The aim is not a mere reproduction or summary of the texts, but the students should demonstrate a critical engagement with them and the ability to connect them with the general themes of the course. The core assignment for the course will be an individually produced 10-page term paper, the topic for which should be drawn from the topics covered in the course. The subject of the paper should be discussed with and approved by the instructor before students start working on it. The evaluation for students from other disciplines depends on their requirements.
